
2022 GORE-TEX Kahtoola Uphill Our Most Successful Ever

The GORE-TEX Kahtoola Uphill came back from the pandemic bigger and better than ever, raising an all-time high of more than \$57,000 to ensure more northern Arizona children develop a love for science, nature, and environmental stewardship. Thank you for your support and all our amazing community sponsors, especially Kahtoola, W. L. Gore & Associates, and Lumberyard Brewing Company. 364 racers, including 46 Camp Colton alumni, took one of three courses up and down Arizona Snowbowl. Bond to Raise \$5 Million for Camp

Part of the \$100 million FUSD school bond on the ballot in the 2022 Nov. 8 election is earmarked for Camp Colton facilities and infrastructure — sustaining and elevating the Camp experience for another 50 years.
